Story Questions (Comprehension)

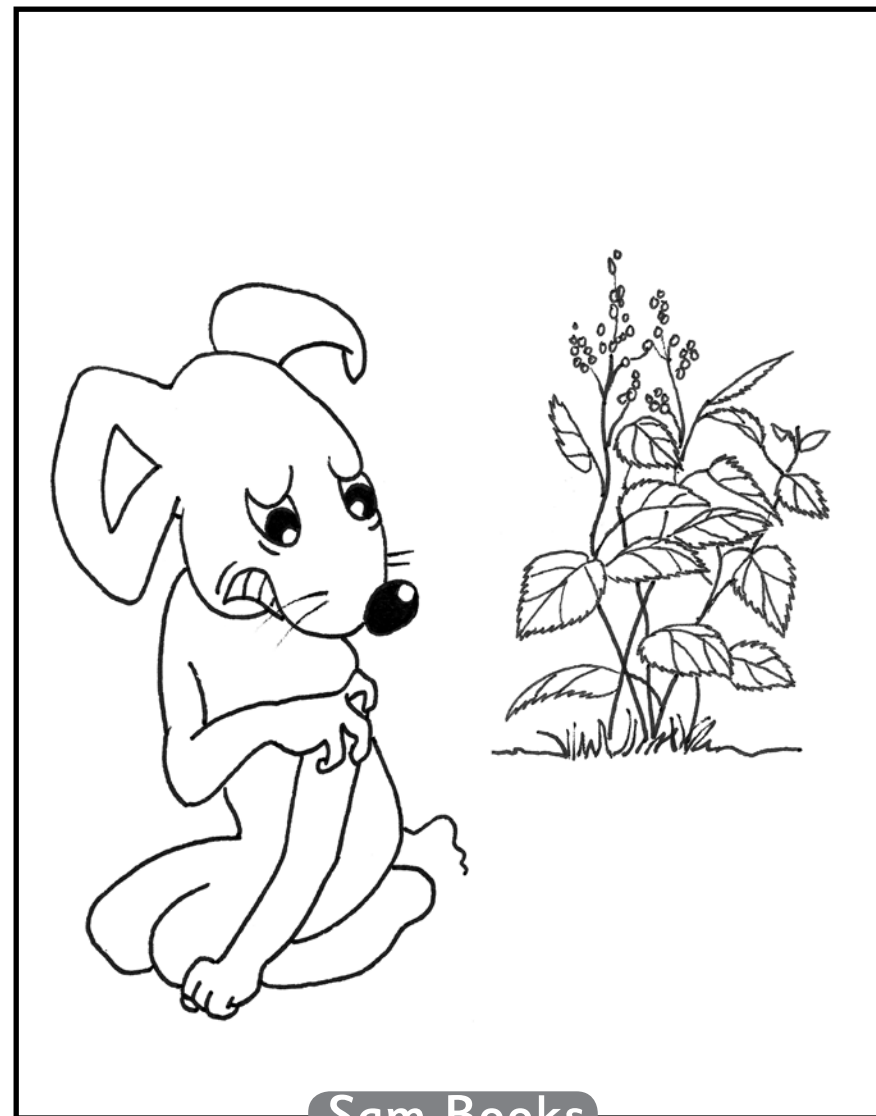
1. page 2: What kind of flowers does Mat pick for Kit?

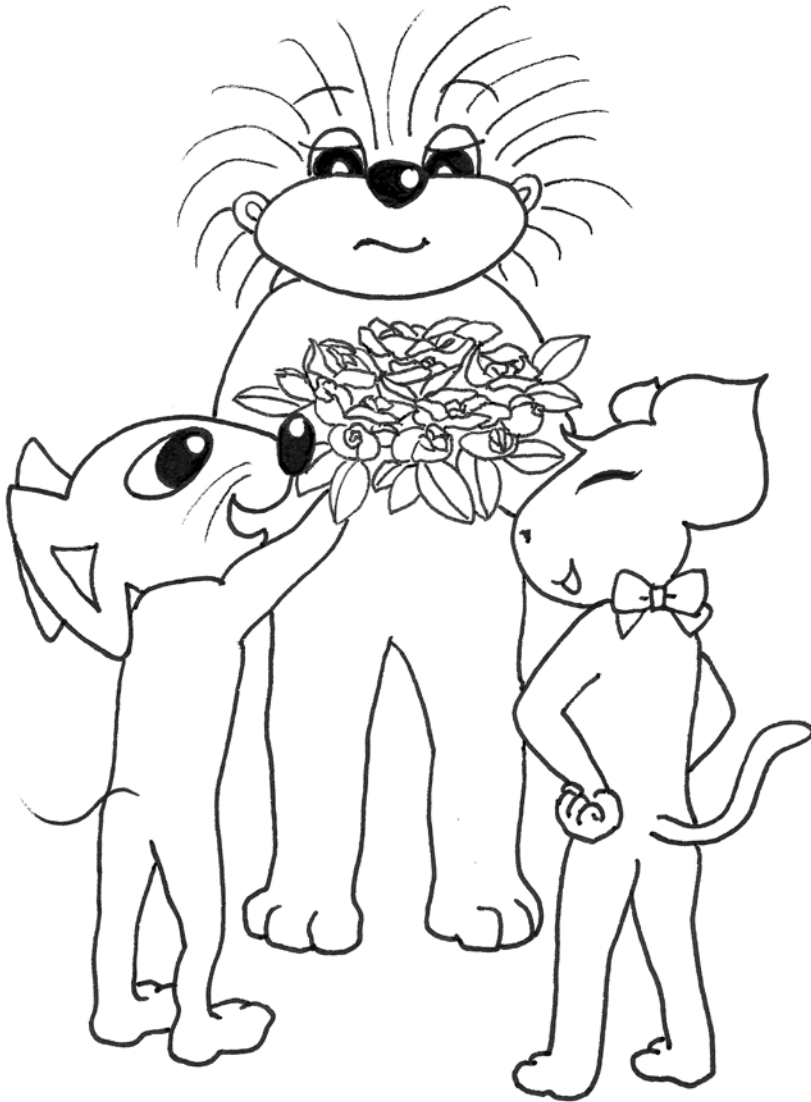

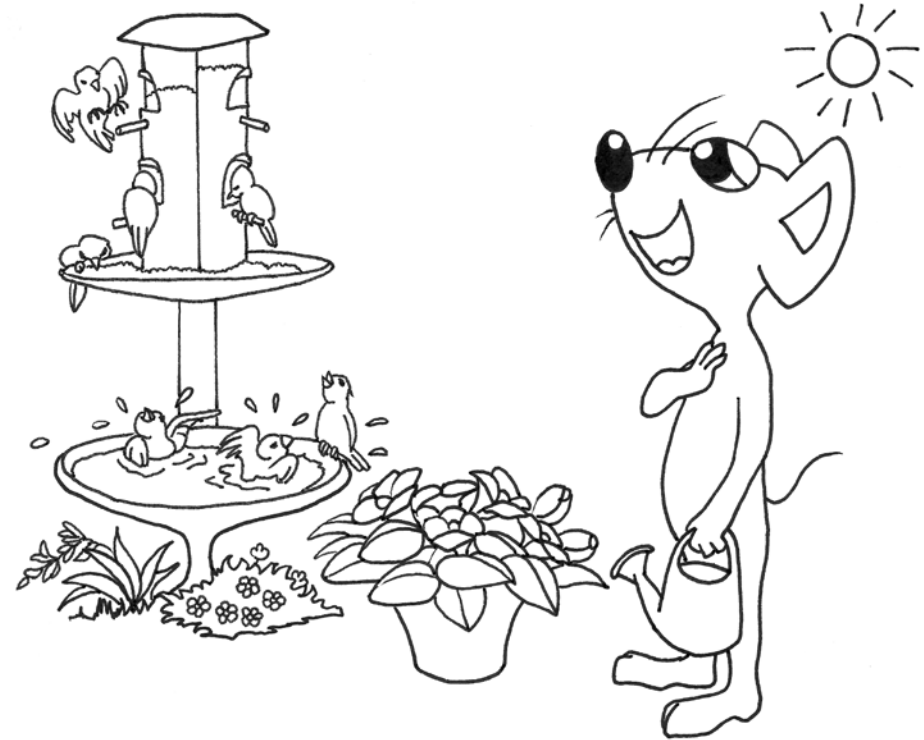

Kit rubs it on Mat's arms.

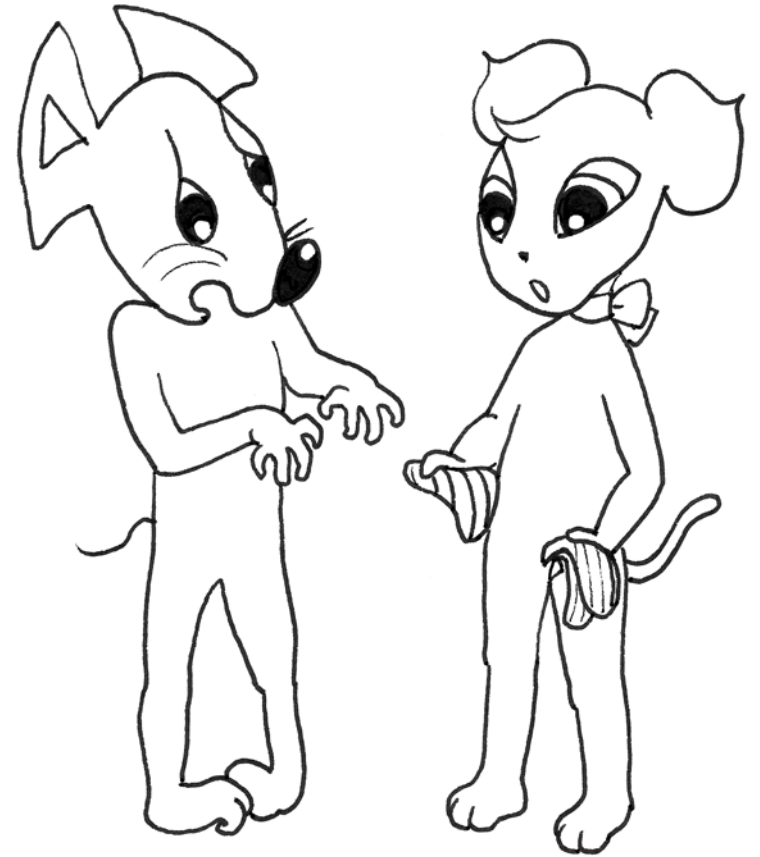
“I am happy today.

She likes red roses.

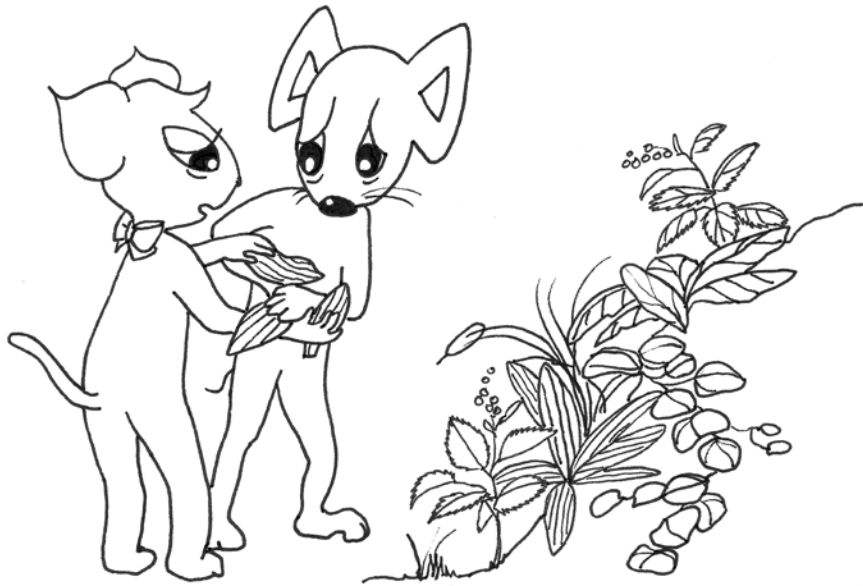
This plant will go well with the roses.”

Then there will be no itch.”



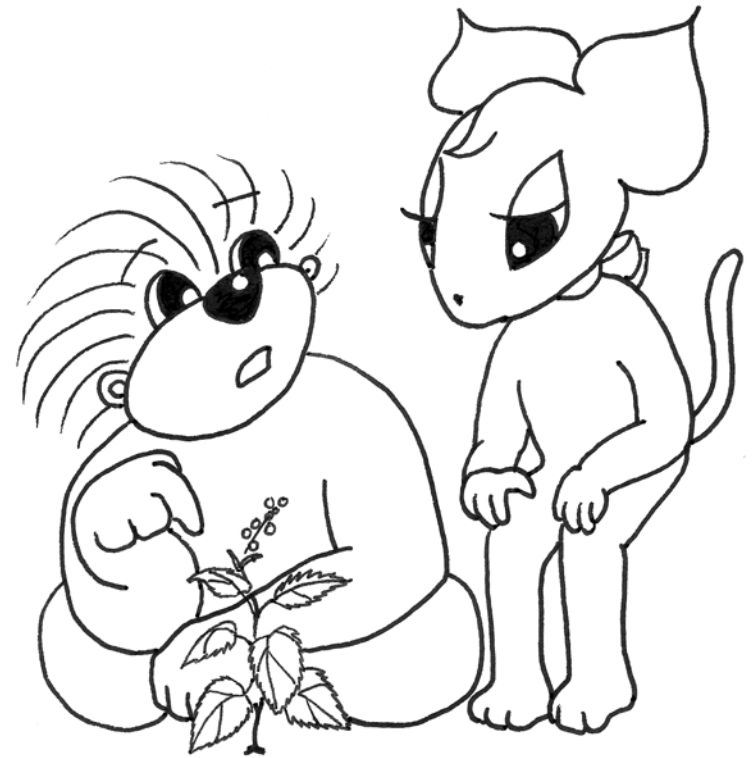
“Mat had a plant like this with his roses.
